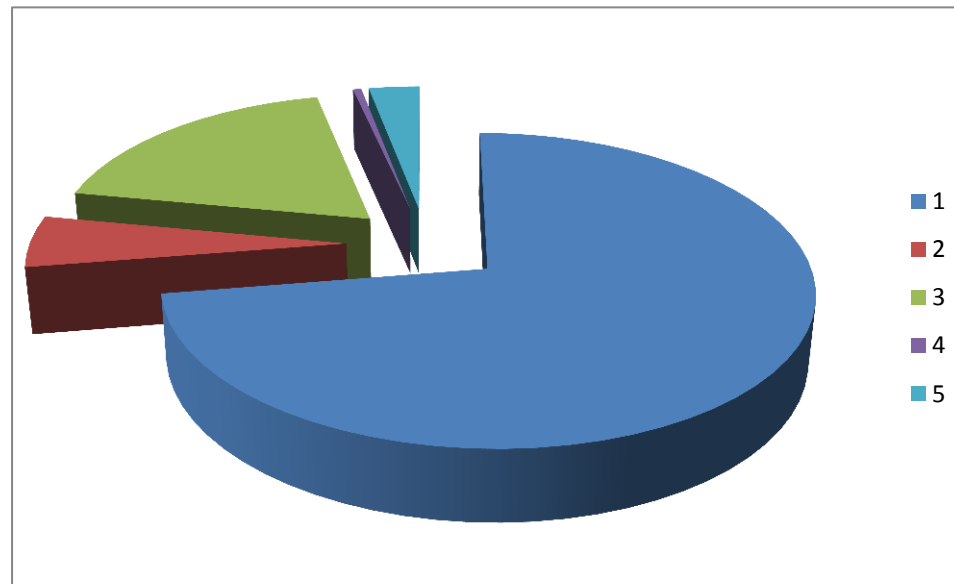


# Pupil Premium Impact Report 2014/15 and Plan for 2015/16

Staffing	£12,266.65 (72.5%)	Teacher training and support staff salaries, intervention and individual coaching and payment of support staff for Breakfast and Home2School club	<p>Out of 14 disadvantaged children, 6 were able to spend one to one or small group intervention time with a TA across all three classes. (This included Reading, phonics and maths)</p> <p>5 of our Pupil Premium children used Breakfast Club on a regular basis.</p> <p>6 of our Pupil Premium Children used Home2School Club on a regular basis. This provided an opportunity for all of them to read with an adult and play educational games (spelling, shapes etc).</p>	<p>On our Home2School and Breakfast Club provision:</p> <p><i>"Amazing! The boys enjoy both and often whinge at me for picking them up too soon. This has boosted the child's confidence in starting secondary school and shown that her success is achievable!</p>

Educational Visits	£72 (0.5%) + individual amounts	Residential trip subsidy, educational visits and visitors, enrichment	Our visits and visitors this year have inspired and supported learning in all three classes. Inability to pay is not a barrier to attending these trips, but an offer of financial support is made to parents of Pupil premium children.
